
Droplet Precautions for Patients & Visitors



Everyone has germs. Most of them are harmless, some are helpful. A few germs, however, can make you sick. Our goal is to protect our patients, their families and visitors from germs that might make them sick. In the hospital, precautions are used as a way of stopping the spread of germs from one person to another. This page should help answer questions you/your family may have.

What are Droplet Precautions?

You have been placed in "Droplet Precautions" because you may have germs living in your lungs or throat that can be harmful to other people. These germs are spread to other people by the droplets sprayed from the mouth or nose when you speak, sneeze, or cough, and can also be picked up when people touch surfaces around you.

What will the hospital staff do?

- Clean their hands frequently with hand sanitizer or washing with soap and water.
- Put a "Droplet Precaution" sign on your door to let people entering your room know what to do.
- Wear a mask and eye protection (eyeglasses are not sufficient) when entering your room.
- Place masks outside your door for use by all staff and visitors.

What can the patient do to help?

- · Clean your hands often, especially after coughing and sneezing.
- Be sure visitors entering your room have read the sign on your door.
- Leave the room only when medically necessary and make sure you clean your hands and wear a mask whenever you do.
- Limit your visitors to a few family members or close friends.

What should my visitors do?

- Clean their hands upon entering and exiting your room.
- Put on a mask and eye protection before entering the room and keep it on while inside.
- Remove the mask before leaving the room.
